Objective: To practice asking and answering questions in pairs and groups.

Sentence: 'The news made Tom sad'.

Text: Sunshine 3, Program Page 47

Time: 30-40 minutes

Materials: Sheet D & E, dictionaries

Summary: An activity that involved working alone, in pairs and in groups.

Procedure: First, ask the students to get into groups of 4 and give them worksheet D. Explain questions 1-5 and ask the students to come up with their own idea for question 6 together.

Then ask them to write their own answers to all the questions. They can use dictionaries if they need. Teachers should walk round the class checking the answers and giving hints to the students who need help.

Ask the students to make pairs in their groups and ask each other the questions, writing their full answer down.

For example: 'Math makes Yuki sleepy'.

After the students have finished, they get in their groups of 4 and report back to the others on their friend. The others will write down the answers in part three, but only have to write brief answers down, for example 'TV' or 'Sport'

Time allowing, you can ask some of the students to demonstrate in front of the class.
